Welcome to Hemlington Hall Academy!

Our school aims to develop children in to 'good people', who will go on to do 'great things'.

Developing children's character, through positive attitudes, fairness, kindness, resilience, curiosity, courage, and independence are central to daily life at Hemlington Hall.

We pride ourselves on being a highly inclusive school which caters for children from Nursery—Year 6.

Within our mainstream school we have 3 Base provisions for children who have special educational needs.

Our Provisions cater for children who meet some of the following criteria;

- Social, Communication and Interaction difficulties including ASD
- Developmental Delay
- Moderate Learning Difficulty
- Severe Learning Difficulty

Our Bases offer personalised and targeted support to meet the very individual needs of each child with highly qualified and committed staff.

Welcome Message from our Head Teacher.

The SENDCo, Deputy SENDCo, Base Teachers and I work with parents, professional services, schools and specialist providers to manage the complex needs of individual children and ensure the most effective and comprehensive support is available. We, also, work closely together in a timely manner to ensure the educational and specialist pathway is well-planned and effective for a smooth transition, when the time comes.

All teaching and support staff are well-trained to support children with additional needs, which underpins our inclusive ethos. We expect excellent

behaviour, respect and good manners from all of our children and in return we promise to provide an excellent education, within a caring school community. Out children grow through our school virtues: fairness, kindness, resilience, curiosity, courage, and independence.

We understand that it can be difficult to decide whether to move your child from their local area to access more specialist provision. Therefore, we have produced this guide to answer some of the questions which you may have as a parent looking to join our school.

Base Provision Overview

Our Base Provisions are able, where it is appropriate, to offer children specialist support for the whole of their primary school life (Reception to Year Six).

The Base provision structured like this;

Base 1— Resource Base Provision for 15 children from Reception to Year 2.

Base 2 — Resource Base Provision for 10 children in Year 3 and Year 4.

Base 3 — Resource Base Provision for 10 children in Year 5 and 6.

own individual starting point.

What is a Resource Base Provision / SEN Unit?

A Resource Base Provision / SEN Unit is a special provision within a mainstream school where the children with a specific type of SEN are taught mainly within separate classes.

The children in the Bases at Hemlington Hall Academy also have the opportunity to join mainstream classes, if appropriate, depending on the needs of the individual child.

How can you apply for a place?

To gain a place in Hemlington Hall's Base Provision an application needs to be made to the Local Authority (LA) SEN Team (contact number in useful contacts) as part of the Base Planning Process, usually by your child's current setting, so they can establish which provider will be best and most appropriate to meet the needs of the child.

In all cases, the LA SEN Team and Hemlington Hall Academy work together to ensure that the admission of a child is appropriate for the needs of a child. The LA SEN Panel decisions are based on and prioritised by a child's individual needs. The number of places are limited each year.

N.B. Being a pupil of Hemlington Hall does not guarantee a place in a Base.

Base 1

Base 1 is our 15 place provision for children in Reception to Year Two.

Learning Environment

Children in Base 1 are taught in a dedicated, purpose built, secure classroom which has its own kitchen and toilet facilities. It also benefits from two quieter, low stimuli working rooms as well as a sensory room and a self-contained outdoor garden space.











<u>Curriculum</u>

Children in Base 1 are provided with a broad and balanced curriculum delivered using a wide range of teaching methods, which enables staff to accommodate individual needs and allows each child to reach their full potential.

In Base 1, staff use story books and special events as a hook for learning. Children will access a range of activities linked to the book/event to develop their core skills of speaking and listening, personal, social, emotional development, Reading/Phonics, Writing, Mathematics, Science, Physical Development, Understanding the World and Expressive Arts and Design.











Teaching and Learning

Base 1 has a dedicated Class Teacher and a team of Teaching Assistants.

There are clearly defined routines in place and staff communicate these in the most effective and personalised way such as using reduced language, objects of reference or PECs.

Children access free flow play with targeted activities delivered by staff in small groups or on a 1-1 basis throughout the day. Such activities are broken down into smaller, achievable steps which are resourced to match the needs of the children and delivered in the most accessible way. Most activities are presented in short bursts to optimise short attention spans.

Staff work closely with external professionals including but not limited to: Educational Psychologists, Speech and Language Therapist and Occupational Therapist to ensure that children are offered the best possible support to reach their full potential.

Base 2

Base 2 is our 12 place provision for children in Year Three and Year Four.

<u>Learning Environment</u>

Children in Base 2 are taught in a dedicated classroom which is placed in the heart of KS2. It has its own break out area set up with independent challenges as well as toys for children to access in their free time. It has toilet facilities nearby.









Curriculum

Children in Base 2 are provided with a broad and balanced curriculum. It is delivered using a wide range of teaching methods, which enables staff to accommodate individual needs and allows each child to reach their full potential.

Base 2 has a 2 year rolling programme of 'contexts' that staff use as a thread through all National Curriculum subject areas.









Teaching and Learning

Base 2 builds on the skills children have developed in their early school life. It begins to further develop independence and offers access to an increasing number of focussed learning activities. Base 2 has a dedicated Class Teacher and two Teaching Assistants.

There are clearly defined routines in place and children are encouraged to use the visual timetable to follow the daily routine.

Children in Base 2 complete a range of activities throughout the day with the support of Teacher or Teaching Assistant. These are delivered in small groups or on a 1-1 basis. They also access independent challenge activities as well as opportunities to choose and lead their own play. Staff use a variety of teaching methods to support child's core skills including, but not limited to: modelling, shared writing, use of individual whiteboards, your turn, my turn, use of laptops and so on.

Staff continue to work closely with external professionals including but not limited to: Educational Psychologists, Speech and Language Therapist and Occupational Therapist to ensure that children are offered the best possible support to reach their full potential.

Base 3

Base 3 is our 12 place provision for children in Year Five and Year Six.

Learning Environment

Children in Base 3 are taught in a dedicated classroom with an additional break out space which is placed in the heart of KS2.







Curriculum

Children in Base 3 are provided with a broad and balanced curriculum. It is delivered using a wide range of teaching methods, which enables staff to accommodate individual needs and allows each child to reach their full potential.

Base 3 has a 2 year rolling programme of 'contexts' that staff use as a thread through all National









Curriculum subject areas.

Teaching and Learning

Base 3 continues to promote independence and develop child's perseverance and stamina to complete longer learning activities. Staff will work with children to develop skills to help them be Secondary School ready.

Base 3 has a dedicated Class Teacher and two Teaching Assistants.

There are clearly defined routines in place and children are expected to use the visual timetable to follow the daily routine.

Children in Base 3 complete a range of activities throughout the day linked to their topic. The staff will work with children to become more independent in completing activities whilst ensuring they are well supported. Children will also access independent challenge activities as well as opportunities to choose and lead their own play.

Staff use a variety of teaching methods to support child's core skills including, but not limited to, modelling, shared writing, use of individual whiteboards, your turn, my turn, use of iPads and so on.

Staff will continue to work closely with external professionals including but not limited to: Educational

Inclusion

We want our children to be as much of a part of Hemlington Hall as their peers in their year group classes therefore, staff work hard to ensure that where is it is possible and in the child's best interests, they may access some inclusion opportunities within their year group class.

This tends to be a bespoke offer for each child but, could include; accessing a specific subject such as PE or Science or joining the class for a visit or for a visitor.

Children will be supported by an adult when learning in their year group classes, but when they are comfortable and confident the supporting adult will gradually be withdrawn (where possible).

All staff in at Hemlington Hall are aware of the needs of the individual children and are trained accordingly.

Standardised Tests

Children are encouraged to work to the best of their potential and where appropriate will sit assessments such as the Phonics Screening check and KS1 or KS2 SATs.

How long will my child stay at Hemlington Hall?

If your child gets a place in a Base at Hemlington Hall Academy, they may be able to remain with us until Year 6. However there will be an ongoing dialogue between staff at school and yourself as to whether a Base remains the best provision to meet the needs of your child.

At the end of their time, or as we assess and review their progress, a decision will be made whether your child transitions back to their previous school, onto a mainstream setting or if they need to transition to a specialist provision where their support can be continued.

How would my child get to Hemlington Hall Academy?

Generally, our children are collected from home by taxi if they do not live within walking distance of our school.

The taxis are provided by the Local Authority and are free to parents.

Children from our provisions travel in groups together, in a minibus style taxi. All taxis have a Passenger Assistant to ensure your child is safe and happy throughout their journey and our staff are ready to meet your child upon arrival. If your child was to be offered a place, the child's current setting would apply for transport and the transport team would contact you to arrange

travel. Hemlington Hall Academy has no control over transport.

For reference, their contact number is detailed in 'useful' contacts' should you have any questions.

What does my child need to wear for school?

Our school uniform is;

- Royal Blue Jumper / cardigan
- White or Pale blue t-shirt
- Grey or black trousers/skirt/dress
- Black, grey or white socks / tights
- Smart black shoes



School will provide children with a PE kit—shorts and t-shirt but ask that you send a pair of black plimsolls into school.

Please put your child's name in every item of clothing including coats and shoes, so that items are not misplaced and can be easily found if they are.



What involvement can we have as parents at Hemlington Hall Academy?

At Hemlington Hall Academy we value the contribution that parents make to their child's education.

In order for parents to be fully involved in the life of the school, when they generally do not drop off or pick up their child from school, both school and home must work hard to ensure the lines of communication are kept open through:

- Dojo app used to communicate between home and school
- Phone contact with a member of Base staff if there are any issues
- Termly parent meetings to discuss academic and social progress
- Parent / child activities such as Christmas Craft day, World Book Day, etc.
- Review Meetings.
